


# Baptism is the action that says, "I'm a follower of Jesus! The old me is gone. Christ has made me new."

- It's a marker. An act of identification.
- It's the beginning of a new life.
- It both required and mirrors the death, burial, and resurrection of Jesus.
- It's the heart-felt response to what Jesus has done.

Luke connects the dots.



In the fifteenth year of the reign of Tiberius Caesar—when Pontius Pilate was governor of Judea, Herod tetrarch of Galilee, his brother Philip tetrarch of Iturea and Traconitis, and Lysanias tetrarch of Abilene—<sup>2</sup> during the highpriesthood of Annas and Caiaphas,

the word of God came to John son of Zechariah in the wilderness.<sup>3</sup> He went into all the country around the Jordan, preaching a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins.

make straight paths for him. <sup>5</sup> Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill made low. The crooked roads shall become straight, the rough ways smooth. <sup>6</sup> And all people will see God's salvation."

<sup>7</sup> John said to the crowds coming out to be baptized by him, "You brood of vipers! Who warned you to flee from the coming wrath? <sup>8</sup> Produce fruit in keeping with repentance. And do not begin to say to yourselves, 'We have Abraham as our father.' For I tell you that out of these stones God can raise up children for Abraham. <sup>9</sup> The ax is already at

the root of the trees, and every tree that does not produce good fruit will be cut down and thrown into the fire." 10 "What should we do then?" the crowd asked. 11 John answered, "Anyone who has two shirts should share with the one who has none, and anyone who has food should do the same." <sup>12</sup> Even tax collectors came to be baptized.

"Teacher," they asked, "what should we do?" 13 "Don't collect any more than you are required to," he told them. 14 Then some soldiers asked him, "And what should we do?" He replied, "Don't extort money and don't accuse people falsely—be content with your pay."

#### So What Happened?

- 1. God sent John.
- 2. John called the people to repent.
- 3. They were baptized to say, "I'm in!"
- 4. John baptized them to prepare them for the coming Messiah.
- 5. The coming baptism involved Spirit and fire.

15 The people were waiting expectantly and were all wondering in their hearts if John might possibly be the Messiah. <sup>16</sup> John answered them all, "I baptize you with water. But one who is more powerful than I will come, the straps of whose sandals I am not worthy to untie. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and

fire. 17 His winnowing fork is in his hand to clear his threshing floor and to gather the wheat into his barn, but he will burn up the chaff with unquenchable fire." 18 And with many other words John exhorted the people and proclaimed the good news to them.

Baptism without repentance was not allowed.



John's baptism identified those who were all in. It was the natural response of a heart that cried out for God.



Baptism was followed by changed behavior. It marked the beginning of a new way of living.



The baptism of John was good, but the promised baptism is much better. It involved the Spirit of God Himself and power.



The same heart that made John's listeners ask, "What should we do?" prompts the same question in us – and we're given the same answer!
