


View God?

The Lord roars from Zion and thunders from Jerusalem; the pastures of the shepherds dry up, and the top of Carmel withers. 1:3

The lion has roared— so who isn't frightened? The Sovereign Lord has spoken— so who can refuse to proclaim his message? 3:8 Come back to the Lord and live! Otherwise, he will roar through Israel like a fire, devouring you completely. Your gods in Bethel won't be able to quench the flames. 5:6

4:6-5:2 "I brought hunger to every city and famine to every town. But still you would not return to me," says the Lord. ⁷ "I kept the rain from falling when your crops needed it the most . . . But still you would not return to me," says the Lord.

⁹ "I struck your farms and vineyards with blight and mildew. Locusts devoured all your fig and olive trees. But still you would not return to me," says the Lord. ¹⁰ "I sent plagues on you like the plagues I sent on Egypt long ago. I killed your young men in war and led all your horses away.

The stench of death filled the air! But still you would not return to me," says the Lord. ¹¹ "I destroyed some of your cities, as I destroyed Sodom and Gomorrah. Those of you who survived were like charred sticks pulled from a fire. But still you would not return to me," says the Lord.

¹² "Therefore, I will bring upon you all the disasters I have announced. Prepare to meet your God in judgment, you people of Israel!"



Amos Predicted An Earthquake in Bethel

I saw the Lord standing by the altar, and he said: "Strike the tops of the pillars so that the thresholds shake. Bring them down on the heads of all the people;" 9:1



Dates His Book by the Earthquake

This message was given to Amos, a shepherd from the town of Tekoa in Judah. He received this message in visions two years before the earthquake, when Uzziah was king of Judah and Jeroboam II, the son of Jehoash, was king of Israel. **Amos 1:1**

200 Years Later, Zechariah Says . . .

I will destroy it from the face of the earth. But I will never completely destroy the family of Israel," says the Lord. ⁹ "For I will give the command and will shake Israel along

with the other nations as grain is shaken in a sieve,

yet not one true kernel will be lost. ¹⁰ But all the sinners will die by the sword all those who say, 'Nothing bad will happen to us.'

¹¹ "In that day I will restore the fallen house of David. I will repair its damaged walls. From the ruins I will rebuild it and restore its former glory . . . The Lord has spoken, and he will do these things.
